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

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In Memoriam

The Warren Sports Hall of Fame would like to remember two State Championship Coaches, who sadly passed away this past year.

Dwight Lafferty

The Warren Sports Hall of Fame would like to recognize Dwight Lafferty, who was the head coach of the 1933 Warren Harding baseball team. The Presidents remain the school's only team to win an Ohio High School Baseball State Championship. They beat Toledo Libbey 8-3 in the Class "A" state semi-finals and then knocked off Pomeroy, 4-2, in the title game. Harding finished the season with an overall record of 10-2.

Bob Heltzel

Recognizing Bob Heltzel who, along with Bob Todd, guided the Warren Kennedy High School boys golf team to back-to-back Division III State titles. The Eagles followed their title in 2000 by winning the crown in 2001 by a whopping 18-strokes over Gahanna Columbus Academy. Future PGA golfer Jason Kokrak took medalist honors with teammates Chris Macali and Colin Clemente tied for third place.



This WSHOF Inductee booklet, produced by Janet Kramer and Aaron Mrvelj, is in memory of Chuck Kramer, WSHOF Trustee and Graphic Artist, who passed away in 2023. The Warren Sports Hall of Fame was formed in 1988 for the purpose of honoring those men and women in our community who have excelled athletically or who have made substantial contributions to athletics in Warren. CLOSING REMARKS

Denny Rossi, Head Coach Warren Sports Hall of Fame



DON ANDRES

When pondering retirement back in 2009, the late Pete Mollica, sportswriter for The Vindicator wrote about Don Andres, "Nobody had more passion or worked harder as a basketball coach. That's also what made it so difficult for the veteran coach to announce his retirement."

A 1963 graduate of Niles McKinley High School, Don was a two-year starter for head coach Joe Bassett. He was the team's leading scorer and "Most Valuable Player.' his senior season earning All-Trumbull County and All-State Honorable Mention honors.

Don continued his playing career at Malone

University, where he earned four letters. A three-year starter, his free throw shooting percentage of 87.3% ranked seventh in the nation his sophomore season. Don led the team in scoring during his junior and senior campaigns. He served as co-captain his final two seasons helping Malone to its first-ever winning season in 1965-66 with an overall record of 16-11. Don received All-Conference First-Team and "Little All-America" Honorable Mention laurels, finishing his collegiate career with 1,187 career points.

An educator for 44 years, Don roamed the sidelines as a high school basketball coach for more than 37 seasons. The final 32 were spent as a head coach at Warren John F. Kennedy (five years), Howland (two stints for a total of 14 years), Niles McKinley (10 years) and Reynolds, PA (three years). He is the architect of 359 career wins producing nine sectional titles and four league crowns. Don was named the Trumbull County "Coach of the Year" on nine separate occasions and was also the District's "Coach of the Year" three times.

In addition to coaching basketball, Don was the boys' cross-country coach at Kennedy from 1970 to 1973 and the boys' golf coach from 1973 to 1976. After finishing runners-up in 1973, Don led the Eagles to the 1974 Class "AA" golf state championship and earned "Coach of the Year" honors. He retired as C.B.I.P. (Career Based Intervention Program) for the Howland School System in 2016.

D.A. has been inducted into the Hall of Fame at Warren Kennedy, Niles McKinley and Howland High Schools along with the Trumbull County Sports Hall of Fame, Curbstone Coaches Hall of Fame and the Mahoning Valley's Italian Sports Hall of Fame.

Don has three daughters; Heather, Kristen (Foster) and Nikki (Frank) along with three grandchildren; Hailee and Douglas Foster and Nolan Frank. His sonin-law, Doug Foster, is currently the head basketball coach at Niles McKinley where Don still resides.



JEFF BAYUK

Widely regarded as a great educator and high school football coach, Jeff Bayuk spent 35 years teaching high school English and Career-Based Intervention while coaching at nine different schools. His coaching career started at Kennedy Catholic in Sharon, PA, in 1978. Jeff then spent five years teaching in the Youngstown Diocese while serving as the Defensive Coordinator at Ursuline under his former high school coach, Dick Angle. He then became the head coach at Canfield from 1986-1990.

In 1991, Coach Bayuk moved on to Hubbard, where he became the school's all-time winningest coach, amassing a record of 121-47. During his 15 seasons with the Eagles, they won seven league championships and made the playoffs six times. He was named the AP Division II Ohio Coach of the Year in 1991.

In 2007, Jeff took over a program in disarray at Campbell Memorial and by his third year, the Red Devils were in the playoffs.

In 2010, Coach Bayuk rejoined his mentor, Coach Angle, at Howland as an assistant and shared in two undefeated regular seasons. In 2012, Coach Bayuk served as Offensive Coordinator at Warren G. Harding. He took the reins at Warren Kennedy in 2014 and eventually led the Eagles to the school's second State championship with an overall record of 14-1 in 2016. Jeff is currently an assistant at Struthers.

Coach Bayuk has been recognized by the Ohio Football Coaches Association for winning 200 games as a head coach in Ohio. He was inducted into the Ohio High School Football Coaches Hall of Fame "Class of 2021." Jeff is also a member of the Trumbull County Hall of Fame, the Hubbard High School Hall of Fame, the Curbstone Coaches Hall of Fame, and the Warren JFK Hall of Fame. He has coached in the Ohio North-South All-Star Game and in the Pennsylvania-Ohio "Big 33" All-Star Game. Coach Bayuk is also on the board of the Ohio High School Football Coaches' Association.

Jeff has been married for 40 years to his wife, Maria. They have two children: Laura (Keith) and John (Brittany); and also two grandchildren, Liam Bayuk and Aubrey Arietta.

GREG BUMBU



A 1983 graduate of Warren G. Harding High School, Greg Bumbu was a three-year letter winner and two-year starter for the Panthers' football team as a wingback, linebacker and kicker. He was captain during his senior season and was selected to play in Ohio's annual "North-South" All-Star game. Greg was also named to the National Honor Society and Buckeye Boys State.

Greg continued his playing career at Northwood University in Michigan, where he

was a four-year starter. Greg was named the USA Today's National Division II "Player of the Week" in his first start as a freshman. As a captain, he earned All-Great Lakes Conference honors. Greg was four-year member of Theta Gamma Epsilon Fraternity, and a Dean's List Honoree. He graduated in 1987 with a degree in Marketing Management.

Greg then returned to the area serving as the Vice President and General Manager of Falls Ford in Newton Falls until 1996, when he became the Owner and CEO of Fairway Ford Mercury in Canfield. Starting in 1999, Greg spent 10 years as the Executive Vice President and Partner of Liberty Auto Group in Cleveland, where he helped the six dealerships grow and prosper. Greg is currently the Executive Vice President and Partner at Nick Mayer Auto Group in Cleveland and Nashville, Tennessee. In addition to that, Greg and his wife, Laura, own and operate several commercial properties in Aurora and Lake Milton. He also works as the color analyst for the Warren Harding Raiders football radio broadcasts.

Greg and Laura (Myers) have been married for 27 years. They have three children: Grant, Ava and Lance. Greg spent time coaching his children in football, baseball and basketball.

BRIAN CROSS



A 1970 Warren Western Reserve graduate, Brian Cross was a standout on the Raiders football team under legendary Head Coach Dick Strahm. He would follow in Strahm's footsteps becoming a Hall of Fame coach.

Brian began his coaching career as an assistant at Pymatuning Valley High School in 1975. After a stop at Mathews High School, he returned to Andover as the Lakers' head coach from 1982-84. After going 9-1 in '84, Brian went to Columbus Eastmoor and won a pair of

division championships before taking over the football program at Grove City in 1987. He went 114-55 in 16 seasons going undefeated in 1990, 1992, 1996 and 1999. His teams won eight Ohio Capital Conference championships. Brian then guided Canton McKinley from 2003-07 posting three seasons of at least 11 wins, winning two regional championships and making an appearance in the 2004 State title game. He moved on to Olentangy Orange, where he engineered a pair of conference titles and State playoff appearances in 2009 and 2011. Brian headed to Columbus Bishop Ready in 2014 and took them to the state playoffs in 2016 and 2017. This past season, he returned to the head coaching ranks at Teays Valley. His more than 250- career wins in Ohio put him in the top-30 all-time according to OHSAA unofficial records.

His list of coaching accomplishments and accolades is extensive. A few highlights include Ohio Capital Conference "Coach of the Year," A.P. Division I and II Ohio "Coach of the Year", Federal League "Coach of the Year", Central District "Coach of the Year," Columbus City League "Coach of Year," and Ashtabula County "Coach of the Year." In addition, he was inducted into the Ohio High School Football Coaches Hall of Fame in 2020.

Brian's teaching career spanned 33 years, retiring in 2015 as a physical education teacher and monitoring credit recovery at Olentangy Orange High School.

MEGAN (TRIMBUR) GALLAGHER



A 2000 graduate of Warren G. Harding High School, Megan Trimbur made her mark as a swimmer for the Raiders. She is the former school record holder in the 50-yard freestyle and 100yard butterfly. Megan was a two-time Sectional champion in the 100-yard butterfly while capturing Sectional titles in the 100- and 200-yard freestyle. She was a State finalist in 100-yard butterfly in 1999 and then a State finalist in the 100-yard freestyle the following year.

Megan was named the Mae Looney "Female Swimmer of the Year" in 1999 and again in 2000. She was a team captain for her senior season, and was selected as Harding's "Female Athlete of the Year." Megan was a three-time North East Aquatic Conference All-Star swimmer earning "Female Athletic of the Year" honors in 2000. She was also among those to be considered as Tribune Chronicle's "Athlete of the Year."

A member of National Honor Society at Warren Harding, Megan continued swimming at Clarion University in Pennsylvania where she competed in the NCAA Division II Championships. Megan received a Bachelor's degree in Elementary Education in 2004, and then earned her Master's degree in Education Administration and Supervision at Duquesne University in 2006.

Megan coached Division I swimming for two years before moving on to teach individual and group swimming lessons for children, ages 6 months to 12 years. She also coached swim camps at Stanford University, the University of Vermont, and Clarion University.

Megan is the daughter of the late Tom Trimbur, who was inducted into the Warren Sports of Fame in 2013. She is married to Patrick Gallagher and has a daughter, Clare. They reside in Dryden, New York.



MARK HERRON

The 11 children born to the late Peter Charles and Lethonia Herron are rounded out by Mark A. Herron. He attended Warren Western Reserve High School and graduated in 1983. Mark started all three years for the varsity basketball team under Head Coach Bob LaRicca. He was twice named the team's "Defensive Player of the Year" and earned All-Trumbull County recognition during his senior season. Mark was a co-captain on the 1983 Raiders' basketball team that ended the regular season with a record of 20-0, placing

them first in the Ohio AP Poll and third nationally in the USA Today poll.

Mark continued on to The University of Akron, where he graduated with a business management bachelor's degree. Before taking a position as a National Account Executive at a nearby electric utility firm, he had a number of years of professional experience in banking. Mark currently works for Cleveland Public Power as the Manager of Commercial and Industrial Sales.

He is blissfully married to Glenda Herron, with whom he shares three grown children: Dominique, Briana, and Mark Anthony Jr. and three grandchildren; Donovan, Davion, and Demi Herron.



JAKE JONES

A 1981 graduate of Warren Western Reserve High School, Jake Edward Jones, Sr., was a two-year varsity football letter winner. He helped anchor the Raiders "Blood D" that recorded four shutouts and gave up only 53 points during the 1980 season. Jake was a twotime All-Trumbull County first-team selection, and was named the Raiders "Offensive Lineman of the Year" as a senior. In 1980, he earned a spot on the All-Steel Valley Conference first-team, All-Northeast Ohio second-team and received All-Ohio "AAA" Honorable Mention.

Jake continued playing football for the late Coach Bill Narduzzi at Youngstown State University, where he was a two-year letter winner. Jake was the starting nose guard in the first-ever game played at Stambaugh Stadium registering eight tackles against rival Akron on September 4, 1982. He earned his Bachelor's Degree in 1987 and his Master's in 1995, both in Criminal Justice, from YSU.

Jake started his football coaching career at Warren Western Reserve In 1985 as an assistant on the late Coach Phil Annarella's staff. For the past 39 years, Jake has coached at various levels in the Warren City School District including the last decade as a member of varsity football staff at Harding.

Jake has worked in the criminal justice field for 33 years, and is the Executive Director at the Northeast Ohio Community Alternative Program, a communitybased correctional facility that provides rehabilitation treatment to adult male and female felony offenders. He is an Ohio-licensed social worker, a licensed independent Chemical Dependency Counselor, and a clinically-certified Domestic Violence Counselor.

Over the past 17 years Jake has worked as a part-time criminal justice instructor at Kent State University's Ashtabula campus, where he taught numerous subjects in corrections and law enforcement. Jake has also worked part-time with the Youngstown State University Criminal Justice Department for several years, teaching the history of corrections, probation, and parole courses.

In 2005, Jake was honored with a Professional Achievement Award by the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Corrections for his commitment and dedication to community Corrections. In 2006, he was inducted into the Trumbull County African-American Achiever Association Hall of Fame. Then in 2017, Jake received a proclamation from Mayor William Franklin for his contribution to the Warren community.

Jake and his wife, Bridgette, have been married 36 years, and have two adult children: a daughter, Samone, and a son, Jake Junior. They reside in Warren.

DON LEE



In 1969, Don moved to Lordstown and worked at General Motors for 40 years. As his sons became involved in sports, he started coaching the Lordstown Hot Stove League from 1975 to 1983. During this time, he also started the Pee-Wee football program in Lordstown. Unfortunately, like today, football was not included in Lordstown's athletic programs. This led his sons Scott, Jason, and Kevin to Kennedy where they would play football for the Eagles. However, Chris would stay and graduate from

Lordstown. In 1984, Kennedy's Athletic Director John Gillen asked Don to coach the Junior Varsity baseball team. A year later, he became the assistant varsity coach until 1993 when Don was elevated to the varsity's head coach. Over his 32-year coaching career, JFK won 13 Sectional Championships, had 13 District appearances with three District titles, and three Regional appearances. His overall record as varsity head coach was 307-219. Don was selected to coach the 2010 Mizuno All-Ohio Team and was named the North Coast League "Coach of the Year" in 2012 and 2017 as well as the Trumbull County "Coach of the Year" in 1993, 2011, and 2012. Don has represented Kennedy as a member of the NEOBCA for 25 years and was inducted into its Hall of Fame in 2011. He was inducted into the JFK's Hall of Fame in 2018.

Don's love of the game of baseball was not limited to coaching. He played softball for 29 years with UAW Local 1112 and various other teams in downtown Warren. He played in 25 National tournaments, winning two (1987 and 1992). He also played in 25 State Tournaments, winning nine State Championships. He was a five-time All-Star, a four-time All-State player, and was named MVP three times, once being in the All-Star Game. Don then played for the Roy Hobbs Organization for several years. His team played in several national tournaments and won the Masters Championship in 2006. Don was eventually inducted into the American Softball Association's Hall of Fame in 2007.

Don is married to the former Evelyn Howdershelt. The couple recently celebrated their 55th wedding anniversary. Their family has grown adding 10 grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren.

DAVID LEE MORGAN, JR.




The Warren Harding graduate is a longtime sportswriter, high school English teacher, public speaker, and author. David Lee was a co-producer of the 2022 regional Emmy Award-winning PBS documentary Lines Broken: The Story of Marion Motley, which was aired nationally on PBS affiliates and distributed by American Public Television. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree in Professional Writing and Editing from Youngstown State University, and his Master of Science degree in Curriculum and Instruction

from Western Governors University. David Lee also received an Honorary Doctorate Degree of Humane Letters from Youngstown State University, where he was the 2022 Fall Commencement speaker. He was recognized by Western Governors University as a Distinguished Alumni in 2023, one of only 15 graduates across the country and one of only two from Ohio.

David Lee is the author of nine books including *LeBron James: The Rise* of a Star, which was selected as one of the year's best books for reluctant young adult readers by the American Library Association. The book also received starred editorial reviews from Booklist and School Library Journal. He is also the author of *Breaking Through the Lines: The Story of Marion Motley* (2023), and an upcoming eight-book children's series called *Black Trailblazers in Sports*, targeting 4th through 7th grade students, that will be available in the Fall of 2024.

Western Governors University named David Lee as a recipient of the school's Distinguished Graduate Award. Fifteen alumni were selected nationwide to receive the award, and David Lee was just one of two distinguished graduates selected from the State of Ohio.

JOHN RUBESICH

A 1974 graduate of Warren G. Harding High School, John Rubesich is proud of his Warren roots that is steeped in rich academic and athletic excellence. He began his athletic endeavors at Harry B. Turner Junior High School as a member and captain of the football team.

John continued to excel in football at Warren G. Harding High School lettering in football his junior and senior years. A cocaptain of the 1973 Panthers team, he was named to the All-American Conference first-team and received

All-Ohio honors as an offensive lineman. Highlighting his senior year, John was voted Most Valuable Offensive Lineman of the 1973 football team.

In 1974, John selected Capital University to further his academic and athletic passion. He earned four varsity letter awards in football playing for legendary Head Coach Gene Slaughter. John also earned numerous awards during his tenure at Capital including All-Ohio Athletic Conference first-team, All-Lutheran first-team honors and was voted "Most Valuable Player" in his senior year.

After graduating from Capital in 1978, John returned to Warren G. Harding as a teacher and coach. He has many fond memories of the student-athletes he taught and coached over the years. John spent 43 years in the field of education as a teacher, coach, principal and superintendent.

LAURA RUBESICH



Involved in athletics nearly all her life, Laura Rubesich excelled as a multi-sport athlete at Capital University. Considered to be a trailblazer in women's athletics, she has witnessed many changes over her career.

In 1979, Laura was hired by the Warren City Schools as a Science teacher, Athletic trainer and Volleyball coach. Shortly thereafter, she became the Assistant Athletic trainer at Youngstown State University. In 1986, Laura was hired by Dr. James Lazor, team physician for the Warren City

Schools, to be the Athletic Trainer for the Western Reserve Orthopedic Center, which served the athletes of the Warren City Schools. In 1994, Laura was again hired by the Warren City Schools as a Physical Education teacher and Athletic Trainer. While teaching in the Warren City Schools, Laura was the coordinator of the 4th grade Learn to Swim Program. She received many accolades over the years from proud parents whose children learned to swim under her supervision.

Laura was instrumental in providing treatment and care for countless athletics in the Warren City Schools during her career. Her expertise enabled Laura to rehab athletes faster so that they may compete at a competitive level for which Warren athletes are known. Laura helped break the glass ceiling in a male-dominated career. As the first female Athletic Trainer in the Warren City Schools she was role model to young women who inspired to become Athletic Trainers in a male-dominated vocation.

When the State of Ohio created the Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapy and Athletic Training Licensing Board, Laura was asked to become a member appointed by the Governor of Ohio. Laura served on the board from 1990 until 1996.
